Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Curriculum Focus

At our school, we believe in the power of assessment to guide and improve teaching and learning. Each year, students in Years 3 to 6 participate in the Check-in assessment, a valuable tool that helps us identify priority areas for learning and tailor our teaching to meet the specific needs of our students. This year's results highlighted areas of focus in mathematics, and over the past few weeks, students in Years 3 to 6 have been engaging in targeted learning activities designed to build their understanding and skills.

One key area of focus has been geometry, with students learning about the different types of angles -acute, obtuse, and reflex-and how to accurately measure them using a protractor. Through hands-on practice and visual learning, students have gained confidence in identifying and working with angles in a range of contexts.

In addition, students have explored the concept of area. They have been learning to measure the surface area of shapes by counting grid squares and developing their problem-solving skills by using the formula Area = Length × Width to calculate the area of rectangles.

This targeted approach, informed by assessment data, ensures that every student is supported in developing essential skills and knowledge. We are proud of their progress and look forward to continuing this focus on tailored, impactful learning.

This year, we have introduced new, research-based approaches to spelling in our Years 3–6 classroom, with an emphasis on helping students understand how English words work. A key component of this approach is the use of rules-based instruction, where students learn and apply spelling rules to develop a deeper understanding of word structure and patterns.

In addition, we have implemented daily Spelling Retrieval Practice. This involves students practising spelling words from memory, which strengthens their ability to recall and apply spelling patterns in writing. Retrieval practice is a proven strategy that reinforces learning and builds long-term retention.

Students have embraced this new style of spelling instruction with enthusiasm, and we are already seeing terrific gains in their spelling ability. These strategies not only improve accuracy but also build confidence in spelling, empowering students to apply their knowledge across all areas of learning.



Why Hygiene Matters: Staying Clean, Healthy and Smelling Fresh

Good hygiene is an essential part of staying healthy, feeling confident, and being ready to learn. For children, developing good hygiene habits early sets the foundation for a lifetime of wellbeing. It's important for students to understand why hygiene matters and how it impacts their daily lives, relationships, and health.

One crucial habit is brushing your teeth with toothpaste every morning and night. Regular brushing removes plaque and prevents cavities, tooth decay, and gum disease. Poor dental hygiene can lead to painful infections, bad breath, and costly dental treatments. Bad breath, in particular, can make social interactions uncomfortable and create unnecessary barriers in building friendships. By making brushing a non-negotiable part of the daily routine, children can keep their smiles healthy and bright.

Showering with soap at least once a day is equally important. Showering removes sweat, dirt, and bacteria that can accumulate on the skin throughout the day. Skipping showers can lead to body odour and skin irritation, which can make students uncomfortable and affect their confidence when interacting with peers. Over time, noticeable body odour or an unkempt appearance can lead to social challenges, as other children may avoid engaging with someone who smells unpleasant or looks unclean.

Hair hygiene is another key factor. Washing hair at least twice a week prevents the buildup of oil and dirt, keeping the scalp healthy and reducing the risk of dandruff or an itchy scalp. Clean hair is also

easier to manage and style, which can boost selfesteem.

Clothing hygiene plays a significant role as well. Clothes should be washed after every two wears (or more often if they've been soiled or sweated in). Wearing unwashed clothes can lead to an unpleasant smell, make students feel selfconscious, and contribute to skin issues. Clean clothes signal self-care and consideration for others, fostering positive interactions.

As children grow, they should also start wearing deodorant. Sweat is a natural part of life, but deodorant helps control body odour, especially as they become more active or enter puberty. This is particularly important for Years 4, 5 and 6 students.

The consequences of neglecting these habits extend beyond physical health. Poor hygiene can lead to social discomfort and even isolation.

Students who struggle with hygiene may find it harder to make and maintain friendships, which can impact their emotional wellbeing and confidence.

By prioritising hygiene, children can feel fresh and ready to learn, build positive relationships, and maintain their health. Let's work together to instil these habits early and set every child up for success—socially, academically, and personally.
